CCF has been working toward building a healthy community for local children and their families since our founding in 1998.

Although most residents enjoy a high standard of living, many of Charlottesville/Albemarle children and families are struggling to meet their economic, medical, housing, and educational needs. What can we do about it? First, we need to become aware of the problems facing local children and their families, and secondly, we need to work together to create ways to address these unmet needs.

CCF...Advisor, Coordinator, Information Source, and Catalyst

CCF is composed of citizen, community agency, local government, education, and university leaders working to improve outcomes for local children and families. CCF serves as an advisor to local government, a coordinator of services, an information source for data, and a catalyst for initiatives that respond to identified needs. CCF members, staff and over 180 work group members work together to:

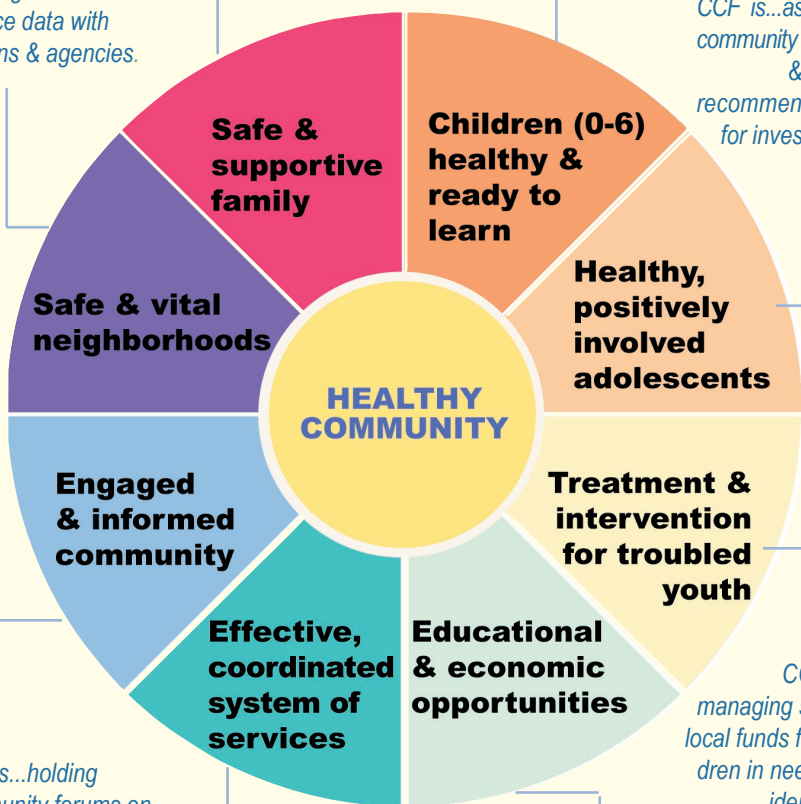
Building a Healthy Community Vital to the Well Being of Children and their Families

CCF is... collecting & sharing economic, housing & social service data with citizens & agencies.

CCF is... convening agencies & residents to reduce the impact of domestic violence upon children.

CCF is... coordinating early childhood development services.

CCF is... assessing community needs & making recommendations for investments.



CCF is... holding community forums on issues facing children and their families.

CCF is... promoting outcome measurement to communicate the value of local programs, and help local programs measure results.

CCF is... providing technical assistance to child and family serving organizations seeking grants.

CCF is... managing state & local funds for children in need, and identifying promising prevention strategies.

What is a Work Group...

...& how does it make a difference in the lives of local children and families? Work groups help CCF to address pressing issues, plan and coordinate an improved system of services for children and their families, and advise local government. These groups - encompassing over 180 individuals - bring together a diverse cross-section of the community.

- **Agency Budget Review Team**

Reviews local community agency applications submitted to the City and County government and makes funding recommendations to City and County leaders.

- **Children Needing Extensive Services Work Group**

Studies the factors leading to children in our community entering foster care and requiring specialized services due to severe behavioral or emotional problems, and explores the best ways to serve them.

- **Community Needs Assessment Work Group**

Identifies the best means of regularly assessing community needs and resources, and presents a profile of what residents feel they need to raise healthy families.

- **Community Relations and Outreach Task Force**

Publishes a print and on-line [Guide to Youth Services](#) with information on over 300 agencies that provide social, health, or other community services to area children. Plans ways for residents to provide direct input on local child and family strategies, such as forums and roundtable discussions.

- **Comprehensive Services Act (CSA) Committee**

Administers the State Comprehensive Services Act for At-Risk Youth and Families.

The Act mandates family-focused, community-based services to high-risk youth and their families. The CSA Committee monitors and approves CSA expenditures, and makes recommendations to the Commission.





- **Data Management Work Group**

Publishes an annual community “report card”, Stepping Stones, on the condition of children and families in the Charlottesville/Albemarle area. The report, published since 2000, tracks a variety of indicators-- everything from the number of children’s books checked out at local libraries to the number of children in poverty.

- **Family Violence Work Group**

Addresses the impact of adult domestic violence on children and develops a comprehensive approach to address child abuse & neglect.

- **Juvenile Justice Advisory Committee**

Implements a strategic plan to improve juvenile justice services for children and families, and links the major components of the juvenile justice system including: the court, the schools, the police, social services, and adult criminal justice services.

- **Outcome Measurement Work Group**

Implements a community agency funding application process that helps funders and agencies understand and measure the impact of their investments in the community.

- **Partnership for Children**

A community-wide initiative focused on children, ages 0-6, and their families. The goal is to build a supportive community where children are born into healthy families and arrive at school ready to learn.

- **Teen Pregnancy/Sexually Transmitted Diseases Prevention Work Group**

Guides a community Strategic Plan for preventing teen pregnancies and sexually transmitted diseases. Engages families, schools, health care services, and community organizations to reduce teen pregnancies and sexually transmitted diseases.

- **Upcoming Work Groups**

Youth Productive Activities Work Group; Community Service Learning Work Group.
